**The** power of profitability through words feeds my mind. I love writing things. I love writing about things

*The amazing power of words never ceases to interest me and I usually write at least one thousand words each and every day.*

It's a shorter read to discuss what cannot be done with words. Even graphics and video are word related because someone has to **write** a code or scripts to enable them to be published.

I'm fortunate because words and written English have generally come quite easily to me, *although it has taken many hours to discover their power and nuances*. But, there are more than a few would-be infopreneurs who find words and writing not so much of an easy thing to master.

But in spite of that I truly believe that when someone wants and craves to master and achieve something badly enough, they'll do **whatever it takes to attain that mastery, and**

**against all odds.**

There are more than a few things about running an online business that used to baffle and confused me (now I mention it, there still are!), but for me it has been worth overcoming **SEVERAL** obstacles, and building a business is the number one priority in my life, - apart from Mrs. J of course 😊 .

I have always thought it worthwhile to put in the effort that is required to achieve what I want from life, and the effort has also included putting together a good set of tools (there's the engineer in me emerging) to help me.

"Words engineering" is one bloody powerful tool, but like a chisel or saw, *it does need to be kept sharp and regularly serviced, so to keep practicing is essential.*

On days when I cannot think of anything to write, that will help my readers - like you - to take another step towards improving, even if in just some small way, then I will write whatever is on my mind at the time.

The practice of getting words onto paper (or word processor) is a critical momentum factor for me, and sometimes I just let myself ramble. It's a bit like physical exercise, it doesn't matter what you do, **just do something.**

Regardless of what your skill set is I would highly recommend and strongly advise that you make writing/typing a vital, essential part of your daily routine...

Once you have the skill set, you have a **BIG** World at your disposal because, in spite of there being much competition, there are

bloggers, webmasters, and publishers all over the web **craving** good writers.

Here's the thing, I'm by no means near the top of the charts, but when people hire me, I charge \$0.06 for each word I write, which is \$24 for 400 words (I know good writers who charge upwards of \$100 for a 400 word article.

I'm happy with \$24 for 400 words - that's just **ONE** page of words. So (and I don't mean to insult your intelligence, I'm just emphasizing the potential) if I do 50 in a week, that's \$1200, so 7 or 8 each day.

*That's without breaking my back,* and I reckon 20 minutes is about the right time for 40 words, for someone knowledgeable about their subject (which you should be), and with just some light research for ideas, rather than learning from scratch.
